MOTION

The Committee on Educational Policies and Pilag (CEPP) and the Institutional Planning and Policy Committee (IPPC) moves that the faculty ommend to the administration that Skidmore terminate its Master of Arts in Liberal Studies ogram (MALS) program; and that the process of termination extend for a reasonal period of transition to allow currently enrolled students to complete their degree requirements.

RATIONALE

The MALS program has been the subject of syffor several years. The program conducted a self-study in 2012 and in the sargrear an External Review was onducted. At the beginning of 2014 and as a response, in part, to the 2012 field Review Team Report that acknowledges that "Skidmore's MALS program is at a crossdeadue to significant institutional and program changes..., especially given recent administrachanges, turn-over, reorganization, and centralization, as well as a significant dieselin the applicant ool," CEPP chartered a subcommittee to examine the program. Dested the Committee on Educational Policy and Planning Subcommittee on Skidmore College Mast Arts in Liberal Studies (CSMP), its general mission was to finake recommendations to CEPP regarding the future direction of MALS programming."

CEPP received a report from CSMP in Janual 2015. Since then, the committee has had the chance to closely examine and deliberate upen the ort's results and recommendations. It has also shared and discussed the with the Dean of Special rograms, Paul Calhoun, and with the membership of the college's litustional Planning and Policy Committee.

CEPP unanimously concludes that, as a mafteducational and stitutional policy, the continuation of the MALS program is not inetlCollege's best long-term interests. Closing MALS, while painful and difficult, is approprta and responsible. CEPP does advise, however, that the College consider the of graduate studies in its ture strategic planning.
